
- In 2014, only 9,000 residential customers were enrolled in payment plan arrangements
- Existing assistance plan was <u>not</u> comprehensive
- Public often confused about assistance and payment programs offered in the city
- Detroit Water and Sewerage

  shut-offs for delinquent accounter

### **Begins to Set New Tone** Blue Ribbon Panel on Affordability





- stakeholders composed of national experts and local Panel on Affordability (BRPA) in October 2015, Detroit City Council convened the Blue Ribbon
- The Panel recommended DWSD:
- Expand assistance programs;
- Improve customer service and billing system;
- Enhance business processes;
- Advance universal access; and
- Design and implement an inclining block rate

#### **Program Benefits:**

- Assistance up to\$1,000 per household per year. \$25 monthly bill credit + help with arrears.
- Home water audit for households above 120% of average usage
- Water saving kits and consumer training classes



Home repairs up to \$1,000 per

- Water Residential Assistance Program (WRAP) on Affordability's findings and recommendations largely designed based on the Blue Ribbon Panel
- More than \$40M allocation over the next 10 years per the MOU with the Great Lakes Water Authority
- Includes five primary benefits delivered by a third-party administrator:
- Freezes arrearages for 12 months;
- Provides \$25 monthly bill credit for one year;
- Offers up to \$700 toward past due balances;
- Conducts water conservation audit with up to \$1,000 in minor home plumbing repairs; and
- 0 around social services as necessary Identifies other needs and secures wrap-

# WRAP Successes & Needs






- Detroit Enrollees
   Non-Detroit Enrollees

- In the first eight months, Wayne Metro received 95,000 calls for assistance
- 80% from the city of Detroit
- Over 11,500 WRAP appointments 4,500 Detroiters enrolled scheduled since March 1, 2016 with over
- Since March 1, nearly \$4M has been committed to WRAP for Detroit residents
- An additional \$2.2 million has been raised to fund WRAP Detroit enrollees
- 465 home water audits and 258 conservation and repair fixes to WRAP Detroit enrollees' homes
- 582 households attended a LIVESMART: Energy. Water. Finances

# Other Water Affordability Initiatives



- Inclining block water and sewer rates in FY 2018-19 to help ensure the affordability of service for volumes required for basic health and sanitary needs
- Impervious area based drainage charges in October 2017 that reduce costs for owners of smaller homes
- "Extended infrastructure" improvement financing that provides for replacement of inefficient toilets in qualifying low-income customers' homes
- MI legal framework



## **WRAP Is Not Enough**






- WRAP needs \$10-\$12 million annually, based on current data, to fulfill the low-income household demand in Detroit
- Water utilities, including DWSD, need a designated federal or state government fund, similar to the Low-Income Home Energy Assistance Program (LIHEAP)

## Lessons of Detroit and Flint:

- Raising rates to recover bad debt expenses is a vicious cycle
- Inadequate funding of needed water utility investments is unsustainable.

# **Detroit's Lead Service Lines**





- Detroit is 139 square miles and has more than 100 neighborhoods
- Mostly single-family homes built prior to 1950
- An estimated 125,000 lead service lines in Detroit
- More than any other in U.S.
- With a 40% citywide poverty rate, many residents cannot afford to replace their service lines without a payment program, government assistance, and/or philanthropic investment



- following MDEQ guidelines confirmed lead service lines, in addition to Emphasized sampling of homes with
- System compliance:
- 90th percentile was 4 parts per billon (ppb)
- Well below the current action level
- Michigan lead action level is expected to be lowered to 5 ppb,
- Importance of replacing the lead service lines is heightened

### **Water Program DWSD's Minimizing Lead in Drinking**




- GIS mapping system of LSLs
- DWSD verifying presence of lead service lines through customer outreach:
- Customers taking a photo of service line in their basement and emailing it to DWSD
- Door-to-door outreach
- Ceasing partial lead service line replacements; initiating full service line replacement pilot
- Working to create a strategy to partner with customers to replace lead service lines
- Sustained federal and state funding support is an essential need for viable long-term financing




## Green Opportunity: City controls at least 40% of the parcels in Detroit





- Detroit's green infrastructure initiative oriented toward more effective, less expensive, wet weather management solutions Unique circumstances:
- Public land holdings
- High storm water management cost structure
- Engaged community partners
- NGOs
- Philanthropic organizations
- Continuing economic distress across many customer groups
- Churches
- Small businesses

# **Drainage Charge Equity**






- All customers are moving to an impervious acreage rate
- Over 50% of homeowners will see a bill reduction
- Phasing by property class through January 2018
- More than 20,000 parcels that never paid a drainage charge began receiving a bill in October '16
- DWSD's drainage charge rate, at \$750 / impervious acre, is among highest in U.S.
- Green credits on drainage charge bills are available for customers who help manage storm water flows

## and Options Expanding **Green Infrastructure Credits Are Available**





- Most credits are based on the amount of annual and peak flows managed, typically on-site
- GM Detroit-Hamtramck Assembly plant receives an 80% monthly credit
   Additional credit options being
- Additional credit options being developed:
- Storm water management education and outreach
- Off-site options for properties without economically viable or effective options
- Developing "template" applications that reduce costs and permit process

## Private Investment **Detroit's Public Investment to Catalyze**



- DWSD constructing GSI practices in compliance with its NPDES permit requirements (approx. \$3M/year)
- "40 Neighborhood Parks"
   Revitalization projects to include GSI
- Installing pervious pavement during select street resurfacing projects
- Post Construction Storm Water
   Ordinance requirements
- Target developments / "20 minute neighborhoods" feature GSI
- DWSD "site assessment and capital assistance" funding under Drainage Charge program

#### Building Market for Green Infrastructure at Scale

- Leveraging Detroit land holdings
- Seeking federal / state / philanthropic support to yield market returns
- Partnering with community advocates to heighten demand / lower costs for GSI

### What DWSD Needs to Serve as an **Anchor Institution in Detroit**



- Infrastructure reinvestment must include support for cities to reinvest in water and sewer infrastructure including full lead service line replacements.
- Low Income Sewer Water Assistance Program legislation (or a facsimile) that income customers is needed recognizes that as water/sewer rates rise, federal/state support of low-
- Revisions to federal/state regulatory frameworks that are effectively blind to the financial burdens imposed on local communities
- Federal/state grant and loan programs that better facilitate public/private green infrastructure and sustainable redevelopment.
- Legally redefining utility service to embrace public health protection and therefore universal access to service — as a fundamental utility obligation.
- In MI, this would, for example, potentially change interpretations of Bolt v. Lansing case that limit DWSD's rate setting and program offerings.
