

Messaging A Greener Detroit: Stormwater Management For Residents and Faith-Based

- For most of the city's 380,000+ parcels, this is not a new charge. DWSD is working to bill all customers the same rate based on the amount of hard, impervious surface on their property.
- Residents and faith-based are the last customer classes to transition to the imperviousacre drainage rate, effective July 2018.
- Residents will receive a 25% automatic credit for disconnected imperviousness. The Drainage Charge for 56% of residents are expected to remain flat or decrease.
- An estimated 20% of faith-based organizations will see a decrease, while about 80% of faith-based organizations are likely to see an increase. A majority of the faith-based organizations will receive the 5 year transition credits.
- <u>Call to Action</u>: Verify data, impervious acres, classification, etc. Residents should have disconnected downspouts. Faith-based organizations should leverage Community Outreach Credits and consider Green Stormwater Infrastructure (GSI).






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Residential Impact Estimated Residential Drainage Charge Transition August 2018


The drainage charge for 56% of residential properties are expected to decrease.

DWSD Payment Assistance

A Greener Detroit: Stormwater Management For Residents and Faith-Based

- WRAP: Residential customers at/below 150% of poverty level receive \$25 credit monthly, past due balance frozen for 12 months and up to \$700 towards the arrearage, water audit and up to \$1,000 in repairs, and additional 12 months assistance if eligible.
- 10/30/50 Plan: Payments spread over 24 months with 10% down payment on past due balance. Eligible for all customers.





Having trouble paying your water bill?

DWSD Introduces 10/30/50 a NEW payment plan

so you can keep your water ON

How it works:

- 1. Make a down payment of as little as 10 percent of your past due balance and you're enrolled in the plan!
- 2. DWSD will spread the remainder of your past due balance over a period of 24 monthly payments*
- 3. If you miss a payment, you can re-enroll by making a payment of 30 percent of your remaining balance. If you miss another paymen you can re-enroll by making a payment of 50 percent of your remaining balance.*

Customer Notification (Spring 2018) A Greener Detroit: Stormwater Management For Residents and Faith-Based

- DWSD will send postcards to customers whose charge remains flat or will decrease (March 2018).
- DWSD will send postcards to customers that will see an increase, inviting them to scheduled meetings at neighborhood churches (March 2018).
- Messaging will be displayed on the Customer Care Web Portal and kiosks (Spring 2018).
- DWSD will send letters to all residential and faith-based customers, confirming parcel(s), impervious acres, current and expected charge. The sequence of the mailing will be by billing cycle (April-May 2018).
- Impervious acres will be a line item on the July 2018 bill, received in August. On electronic bills, hyperlinks will be used to direct customers to the Parcel Viewer.



Drainage Charge Update

A Rate Change is Coming July 2018... With Little to No Impact For You

You may have heard that DWSD is changing the drainage charge. Yes, DWSD is working to bill all customers the same rate for drainage, based on the amount of hard, impervious acres on their property. Stormwater flows from rooftops and driveways, picks up dirt and debris, enters our combined sewer system and must be treated. The drainage charge recovers the cost for this service.

This summer, most residential customers will transition from a flat monthly fee (\$20.63) to an impervious-acre based rate. For having a greater share of disconnected areas (lawn) where stormwater runoff can flow, residents will receive a 25% credit. Customers receiving this notice should be billed about the same amount or see a decrease. Charges will be reflected on bills starting August 2018. See back side for more information.



Keep Untreated Sewage Out of Our Rivers

To keep our waters clean, stormwater management is critical. DWSD has nvested \$1.5 billion in wet weather treatment and must recover \$151 millio each year in stormwater related costs.

Residents can help DWSD keep untreated sewage discharges from our waters by reducing flows to the system. Residents should disconnect downspouts an lirecting stormwater to their lawns






Face-to-Face Engagement (Mar – Aug 2018) A Greener Detroit: Stormwater Management For Residents and Faith-Based

- DWSD mapped residential impact by identifying high-increase and low-income customers.
 Outreach schedule prioritized for these areas.
- Host residential meetings at neighborhood churches. Churches earn Community Outreach Credits.
- Deploy C.A.S.T. (Customer Assurance Specialist Team) to provide live billing updates at select events.
- Align with scheduled meetings by City Council, Dept. of Neighborhoods, City Departments, DEGC, Nonprofit partners, Condo Associations, etc.
- Echo meetings/messaging through DWSD advertising and media campaign.


